Publishing Ethics for Authors – NCMLTS-2025 Conference Proceedings

All authors submitting papers to the **National Conference on Modern Library Technologies and services** (NCMLTS-2025) are expected to adhere to the highest standards of ethical conduct in research and publication.

The following ethical guidelines must be strictly followed:

1. Originality and Plagiarism

- Authors must ensure that their submitted work is original and has not been published elsewhere.
- Proper acknowledgment of the work of others must be given, and citations must be accurate.
- Plagiarism in any form, including self-plagiarism, is strictly prohibited. All submissions will be screened using Turnitin plagiarism detection software. The accepted papers should have <10% similarity for consideration to the publish in proceedings.

2. Multiple Submissions

- Manuscripts must not be submitted simultaneously to more than one conference, or any other publications.
- Redundant publication (publishing substantially the same work more than once) is unethical and unacceptable.

3. Authorship

- Authorship should be limited to those who have made a significant contribution to the research and writing of the paper.
- All co-authors must approve the final version of the paper and agree to its submission.
- Any changes in authorship must be disclosed and approved by all authors before final publication.
- All authors need to send their copyright concent form for the final publication in proceedings

4. Data Integrity and Fabrication

- Authors must present accurate, verifiable data and analysis.
- Fabrication, falsification, or manipulation of data is a serious ethical violation and will lead to immediate rejection or retraction.

5. Acknowledgment of Sources

- Proper acknowledgment of all supporting parties, including funding sources, institutions, and individuals who contributed indirectly, must be made.
- Any use of copyrighted material must include permission and appropriate credit.

6. Conflicts of Interest

- Authors must disclose any financial or other conflicts of interest that could influence the results or interpretation of their manuscript.
- All potential conflicts must be declared at the time of submission.

7. Post-Publication Responsibilities

- If a significant error or inaccuracy is discovered after publication, the author must promptly notify the conference organizers or publishers and cooperate in correcting or retracting the paper.
- Authors must respond to editorial queries during the peer-review and publication process in a timely and transparent manner.

8. Compliance with Review Process

- Authors must participate in the peer-review process and respond respectfully and constructively to reviewers' comments.
- Attempts to influence the review process through unethical means (e.g., suggesting fake reviewers, lobbying editors) will result in immediate rejection and blacklisting.
