

Investigation Competition – Guidelines

(As part of MIFCON – Manipal International Forensic Science Conference)



About the Competition

The Crime Scene Investigation (CSI) Competition is designed to test the participants' knowledge, practical skills, and critical thinking in investigating a simulated crime scene. It integrates forensic science, law, criminology, and criminal justice principles to encourage an interdisciplinary approach to solving crimes.



Structure of the Competition

1. Orientation Session

A briefing will be provided on the competition rules, case background, and expectations.

2. Crime Scene Visit (15 minutes)

- Teams will be allowed to observe the mock crime scene.
- Participants must not alter any element at the scene.

3. Tasks to be Performed:

- o Crime Scene Observation and Documentation (sketches, photographs)
- Evidence Collection
- Hypothesis Formation & Brief Forensic Report
- o **Presentation to Jury** (5–7 minutes, followed by Q&A)

4. Report Writing (30 minutes)

- Based on their observation, participants must prepare a detailed report including:
 - Background of the crime
 - Sketch and photographs of the scene

- Evidence Log
- o Classification of evidence and its legal relevance
- Hypothesis of suspect(s)
- o Reasoning for the hypothesis and possible modus operandi

4. Presentation Round

- Teams must present their investigation findings.
- The presentation should highlight:
 - Evidentiary value
 - o Relevant legal provisions
 - o Crime reconstruction

Rules & Regulations

- All participants must adhere to the dress code: **Formal attire**.
- Participants are **not allowed** to use personal cameras or mobile phones during the event.
- Official photography devices will be provided.
- Evidence identified may be marked by volunteers, and supporting forensic data will be provided upon request.
- Any tampering with the crime scene will lead to disqualification.
- No changes in team composition are allowed after registration, unless permitted by the organizers.

III Judgement Criteria

- Observation and attention to detail
- Analytical and logical reasoning
- Sketching and documentation skills
- Quality and accuracy of the report
- Presentation clarity and legal understanding
- Ability to deduce sequence of events, suspect, and motive
- Evaluation Criteria:
 - Scene documentation quality and thoroughness
 - Logic and scientific reasoning behind the hypothesis
 - o Knowledge of evidence handling and forensic procedures
 - Teamwork and time management
 - Clarity and confidence in presentation

2. Important Notes:

- o Participants must report at least 30 minutes prior to their assigned slot.
